# **Building a Better Brother Part 1** *The Caring and Feeding of Prospects*

Over the last few months I have had Brothers come to me and express concern over why we have such a small attendance in lodge and why we don't seem to be initiating many new Brothers. This question is not new, nor is it confined to our Lodge. The answer is simple on the surface, but requires a number of specific things to make it happen. The short answer is – make the Lodge a place where people want to be. Any organization – no matter if it is a business, a government agency, or a fraternity – has certain elements that must be present in order to be successful. It must attract and recruit good people, it must train them effectively, and it must retain them. None of these activities are stand alone, they must function in concert to achieve the desired result – a strong and vital Lodge.

This month I will focus on attracting and recruiting good men with the objective of making them Masons. First ask yourselves, "What is it that attracted me to the Craft?" Speaking for myself, it was the desire to belong to something bigger than myself, to be a part of an organization with the professed goals of improving the character of its members and thereby making each of us better men, better husbands, better fathers, and better members of the community as a whole. In short, I saw men who made me say, "Wow, I want to be like him (or them). What is it that makes them comport themselves like that and how do I get it?" So the first element in attracting good men and Masons is, **Emulate the Values of Masonry in Your Daily Life.** Be a Mason every day, in every way.

Next, keep an eye out for men who you feel have the qualities that would make a good Mason and talk to them. Now, we can't shove a petition into someone's hand and tell them to join, but there is nothing that says we can't



expose them to the Fraternity and invite them to dinners, events, or gatherings. Over the decades we have – as an organization – lost our brand identity. Most of the general populace has no idea what Freemasonry is, or they have gotten a warped perception of it through the media and entertainment industries. Know your craft, what it is and what it isn't, and what it means to you. Each of us comes to Masonry in our own way – for me it was through my sons' involvement in DeMolay – but the common deciding factor for every Brother I have talked to is the passion for the Craft they felt from the Masons they met. For many of us, answering a prospects questions can figuratively turn into giving them a sip of water from a fire hose, but that isn't necessarily a bad thing – after all, how can you expect someone else to be attracted to something you aren't excited about yourself? Remember that a lighthouse that has a dim lantern or is hidden from view doesn't do much good. Its purpose is to shine brightly and guide travelers into a safe harbor. In Masonic terms, Spread the Light Liberally! After all, it's hard to find something that you don't know is there.

Finally, and I can't stress this enough – be involved. When we do get a prospect at a dinner or an event, it doesn't look appealing if there aren't many people in attendance. Part of the attraction of Freemasonry is the fellowship of kindred minds. One can believe in all the tenets of the Craft, but if we attempt to practice them from our couch in front of the television, it doesn't accomplish much. When we are together, we achieve synergy – the whole becomes greater than the sum of the parts.

This is one of Masonry's greatest strengths and we should revel in it. Being involved also helps to guard the West Gate. One of our most important duties as members of the lodge is to cast an informed ballot on a prospective Brother. Have you ever cast a white ball for someone you didn't really know? Or worse yet, someone whose face you couldn't put to the name on the petition? If you can emphatically say no, then you have my admiration and heartfelt thanks. For most of us however, this is not always the case. Being involved means establishing connections with these prospects before they even turn in that petition, building on that desire to be among like minded men as we work to divest ourselves of the imperfections in life, transforming ourselves from the rough to the perfect ashlars the Great Architect intended us to be. In this respect, a lodge should be like Cheers – a place where everybody knows your name, and they're always glad you came. We need to remember, first a friend then a Brother. So make the effort to Make the Connection! and it will pay dividends in the Lodge, in the minds of our prospective candidates, and in our own lives.
